Mrs Campbell felt it was heartbreaking to see the garden in its current state and she believes it does little for the town. Mrs Campbell feels that the grassed area should be returned and a place for the Remembrance crosses too as this was the first year there wasn't a place for the crosses to be planted.

#### **Structure of the ACE Working Group**

#### Introduction

This paper explains the formation of ACE Monmouth and its relationship with Monmouth Town Council.

#### **Background**

Monmouth Town Council unanimously declared a climate emergency in April 2019 and set up a working group to decide how to proceed. The working group was comprised of councillors and two members of public who were present at the council meeting when the emergency was declared. The working group met and agreed that there should be a public meeting to gather ideas and volunteers to respond to the climate emergency. It was also agreed that ClIr Blair would be the working group lead.

#### **ACE Monmouth group**

The public meeting took place in May and around 60 members of public came and some councillors. This event was reported in the Beacon. The event was very lively and generated a lot ideas, A second meeting was then held with the collated ideas and members of the public were invited to vote on their top five projects to take forward, An electronic poll was also set up to allow those who couldn't attend to vote. People were invited to vote for projects they liked and would be willing to work on. So we were able to generate a list of projects that had practical support. The public meeting also voted on a name for the group "ACE Monmouth".

The projects that were agreed were

- 1. Green spaces to look at enhancing our green spaces to support biodiversity and climate change.
- 2. Repair cafe to set up a monthly repair cafe to support reuse and keep items in use for longer.
- 3. Festival to host a festival to help residents learn about climate change and respond to it positively.
- 4. Bike friendly Monmouth to promote cycling as transport around Monmouth, support the Active Travel agenda.

The groups have progressed the projects with a monthly repair cafe being established in Rockfield Community Centre, the green spaces group have worked with Monmouthshire County Council to identify twelve areas that could be enhanced for wildlife through planning trees and allowing wild flowers to flourish; the Bike friendly group have hosted a successful Dr Bike event in the autumn.

#### Structure

The working group is a town council group. The membership has expanded since the original group set up in April 2019 and some councillors have not attended since the first meeting. Four sub groups of the working group work on the separate projects.

The subgroups report back to the working group on their progress and with requests for finance or support from the council. The working group continued to meet regularly pre-Covid but has not met since. The subgroups have continued to work and have fed back directly to Cllr Blair who has then fed back to the council.

This is reported back to the Environment Affairs Committee in the standing item or as a separate agenda item for funding. Finance has been secured for a PAT tester for the repair cafe, trees (with conditions) and tools for the green spaces group, a Dr Bike for Spring 2021.

The four project groups work in fairly autonomously but with councillor input. The groups have constituted themselves to allow them to raise funds through grants and manage finances. The groups still report back to the working group and pursue the aims agreed at the early meeting.

Cllrs Bryn, Dewhurst, Jackson-Graham, and Jupp remain active members of ACE and Cllr Blair is the lead councillor.

#### 01. Sustrans Sculpture

(a)To receive presentation from Mrs. Angela Jones regarding the purchase and installation of Interpretation Boards for the Sustrans Sculpture in Blestium Street.

The group welcomed Angela Jones who told the group that the Sustrans portrait bench is still not seen at its best and therefore she proposed that an interpretation/story board (800mmx400m) is purchased to draw attention to the statue. The interpretation board would tell of the history of the bridge, the market and it would be included on the Sustrans website. Angela confirmed that she has quotes for storyboards to go behind the statue in the same format as the one for the Norman Bridge (would include tidying the current one). She has a quote from Platform 1 who use Chillipepper signs which are both local businesses. The quote is £477.00 exc VAT (£572 inc) from start to finish. Angela confirmed that she is still looking for more. Angela hopes to get the story board up for the summer for when people are out and about again.

Cllr Christopher reminded Angela of the need to obtain 3 quotes for the purpose of financial regulations. He also questioned whether MCC had been approached as part of their improvement plan for Monnow Street. Angela confirmed she had but she was mindful they didn't have a huge sum of money. Other members of the group were concerned that if relying on MCC, there could be added delay, whereas Environment Committee could approve payment for the story boards at the next meeting on 1st March 2021.

Cllr Blair asked whether it was too late to move the statue and Angela confirmed it was due to the structural work that was required to have the statue installed.

In addition Angela explained that ancient buildings, such as the Monnow Bridge, were often limewashed and both CADW and Brecon Beacons National Park have supported buildings being limewashed in the past. Angela advised that the corner of town, where the statue is, needs brightening up and painting the area will make a difference to the area and to the visibility of the statue. However, Angela advised that she is not looking at quotes for this yet.

Cllr Dewhurst advised that there was still funds available from the Links Project and Angela confirmed this. There is £247.00 left in the fund so this would be used towards the cost of the storyboards etc.

Cllr Christopher asked whether planning permission was required for the works and Angela advised that she had met with CADW on site and they were happy it would tie in with the story board on Monnow Bridge.

Consideration was given to installing ground lights or spot lights to draw more attention to the sculpture. Angela advised that she hopes this would be possible in the future but this requires further consultation regarding the surroundings of the statue and the intricacies of pipework etc underground.

(b)To discuss and agree whether or not to make a recommendation to the Environmental Affairs Committee to fund the purchase and installation of the Interpretation Boards for the Sustrans Sculpture in Blestium Street.

Recommend that we take to Env. Affairs to purchase the story boards as proposed by Angela Jones with a budget of £500.00 Proposed: Cllr White Seconded: Cllr Treharne Unanimous

Angela Jones agreed to obtain more quotes in line with financial regs and to contact MCC Heritage and CADW to obtain permissions in readiness for meeting on 01.03.2021.

C. Williams advised that internet quotes would be sufficient for financial regs.

#### **02. Christmas Lights**

To discuss the Christmas Lights Tender and agree date to commence tender process.

Cllr Christopher suggested that the tender process should start in June and members of the group agreed with this. It was felt that this would allow a new company (if chosen) to collect the equipment from the current contractor.

- C. Williams advised that clarification of Appendix 1 is needed before ITT is confirmed.
- C. Williams will check with P. Hartley as to whether she is happy for the ITT to be distributed to members so that they can consider the plan and ensure it is still what is needed/ wanted.

Chris Munslow reminded the group that MTC we owns ¾ of the lights and so any change of plan may be expensive. Cllr Blair stated that when the contract was revisited last time, quotes for new lights and the costs were prohibitive for making changes.

#### **03. History Banners**

To discuss and agree a recommendation to the Environmental Affairs Committee regarding the future of the 12 history banners situated on Monnow Street/Agincourt Square.

Cllr Treharne questioned the expenditure on history banners at the moment but felt that the banners brightened the town and so would be a worthwhile expenditure. Cllr White and Blair questioned whether the banners would be needed with the proposed planters plan bringing more colour to the town. Cllr Dewhurst suggested changing the banners to a different colour with a border so that they are bolder and more attractive. Cllr Dewhurst suggested asking Platform 1 to use the same design with a different colour scheme.

Regarding the fittings of the banners, Chris Munslow advised that the banners do break down due to the wind and interference from different contractors. He advised that the clips need to be made more secure and solid and that they could be wider (3-4 maybe 6 inch wider) which could add more stability. He also suggested that an additional clip may keep the banners tight.

The costings provided were considered and it was noted by the group that Genesis offered installation services as well as design. At the moment, Chillipepper signs are not willing to install due to health and safety concerns.

Recommend to EA that Platform 1 is considered to give banners a new colourway with a border AD SW Unanimous

Consideration was given to how the community could get involved with the design of the banners, with Cllr Treharne wondering whether school children could design the banners for the following Council term.

#### **04. Town Planters**

To discuss additional planting of bulbs in the town's planter's.

The members of the group noted that the planters have been lovely but could do with some colour now. It was agreed that C. Williams would write to Russell Walker to see if he has plans to include bulbs in the planters in town. If there wasn't a plan for bulbs, C. Williams is to ask for a quote for including some so that it can be discussed at the next meeting.

R. Morgan	Add	My suggestion for garden is to extend a patch from the memorial towards the tree but not entering the 'canopy' of the tree to be wild meadow grass. This would be a lawn for 80% of the year but be allowed to grow up a meadow during may and june (when people do not go into the memorial anyway). this should be a win win situation - it provide flat space on which people can walk and stand during armistice day service. But has the envornmental benefits of bein wild flower meadow in the summer. Mowing costs would be minimised as it would only a require 3 cuts a year - August, early November, and March. This 'lawn' could be extended to the whole of the western side of enclosure and the Catalpa side could be left as native planting. As was agreed to do some time ago I understand.
W. Englefield	Кеер	The Catalpa Tree, Runner Up of the Tree of the Year 2020, was suffering badly from soil compaction due to regular mowing. Nature isn't Neat came up with a completely concept and in consultation and with approval of Monmouthshire County Council an under the expert guidance of a specialist wildlife garden designer, planted flowers and plants suitable for the location, ensuring it provides maximum biodiversity and shelter and food for pollinators. As with regards to the weeds, they are often precisely the plants that provide shelter or food for pollinators. As volunteers we are aware of the public image of the garden and will manage the planting sensitively, but it would be counter productive to for example totally eradicate nettles as they are a major plant for butterfly caterpillars. It is helpful to rename weeds as wild flowers.
		Monmouth has declared a Climate Emergency. Therefore Monmouth should be committed to stem the loss of biodiversity. In the words of Sir David Attenborough: "It is that range of biodiversity that we must care for - the whole thing- rather than just one or two stars."
V. Mitchell	Кеер	I trust that the Town Council will not countenance any change to the plan that they agreed to and which, on their behalf, was undertaken by Monmouthshire County Council and Transition Monmouth.  Having said that:
		<ul> <li>Part of the plan was to allow wildflowers (weeds to some) free reign because of the environmental benefits they provide. Now that we have had an opportunity to see what germinated from the soil bank, Transition Monmouth will be more assiduous in removing those that overwhelm</li> <li>We understand that the British Legion would like a small area to be clear of plants from November to February for their memorial crosses. G. Meadows	Кеер	I hear that there is a movement to change the newly planted Memorial Garden. Please do not do this, time money and skill with awareness of how we absolutely need to change how we use nature has gone into this very positive project which had full agreement of the council.
Royal Engineers Association	Change	<ul> <li>Our Objections</li> <li>No consultation took place between Monmouthshire County Council (MCC) and any of the veteran groups or associations in the Town.</li> <li>The site was handed over to a small body of well-intentioned people, who then apparently without consultation dug up the lawn and borders and planted wild flowering plants supplied by MCC. Over time this planting has reverted to an unsightly patch of weeds.</li> <li>The actions of MCC and Transition Monmouth have caused anger and distress to our members and the wider Veterans community of the town. The Memorial and its associated gardens were dedicated to honour the memory and sacrifice of those who gave their lives in war. We consider that in its present condition the</li> </ul>

		garden is an affront to their memory and significantly detracts from the appearance of St James Square locally as well as reflecting badly on Monmouth as a town
		<ul> <li>Our Proposal</li> <li>We sympathise with the aim of having a natural and attractive area with a wildlife and bee-friendly planting pattern. However we also consider that to maintain its intended purpose as a solemn tribute to the fallen even a wild garden area requires some continuing human intervention.</li> <li>As a compromise we would like the area directly behind the memorial and up to three meters laid to lawn with borders. To help the environment, the remainder of the site could be turned into a maintained wild garden that would be both aesthetic and in keeping with the purposes of the memorial.</li> <li>Our Conclusion</li> <li>The tree situated within the ground of the site will unfortunately not survive into posterity. The memorial however</li> </ul>
		will still be there for centuries to come and will remain a focal point of remembrance for us all. The memorial and the garden must be maintained and protected now and in the future.
R. Routh	Add	I propose we unite and form a compromise to represent the garden both of remembrance and the future. I have combined self-setting wild flowers with sharing space the space of beloved annuals and perennials in carefully chosen pots, interplanted appropriately. I am sure the professional local gardeners can come up with plans to please many of us and make the garden a tribute to past heroism and a joy of the future. This could also preserve the beautiful prized Catalpa tree as its roots would not be disturbed and damaged by too much digging. And if a few "weeds" creep into the pattern they could add to enjoyment.

Farrar	Кеер	I understand that some people like close cut grass and neatness but I think that many more people like to see sustainable and low maintenance pollinator friendly planting surrounding the magnificent Catalpa tree and War Memorial. Well done to everyone who in my opinion have improved the area and please leave it as it is.
H. Relyea	Кеер	I was very upset to read that there had been discontent over the plantings at the war memorial by the Transition Monmouth team, who paid special attention to the preservation of the famous Catalpa tree. It appears that the town has given little chance to last years gardening efforts, as experienced gardeners understand that new plantings take a least a year or more to develop and grow. I therefore endorse Transition Monmouth's efforts to implement sustainability to the beautiful town of Monmouth, to improve the small bits of common ground for our future generations. I humbly request that you please give them a chance to complete their initial efforts and not expend more money or try to undo their generous effort to beautify the War Memorial garden.
R. Parkes	Кеер	I feel strongly that the excellent resulting work done on this area by the volunteers of Transition Monmouth led by Vivien Mitchell is absolutely the right strategy to adopt given the current climate emergency that we are all facing.

L & R Wills	Change	<ol> <li>Lack of consultation - why? residents in the town and even St James Sq the military or the church.</li> <li>The site of the War Memorial is small and should not be cluttered "Less is More" The Catalpa Tree is dominant.</li> <li>The War Memorial Garden is situated in St James Square which has fine architectural buildings - a formal setting.</li> <li>The War Memorial should be respected, not with weeds, the look is messy.</li> <li>The wooden planks put to retain new soil look totally inadequate.</li> <li>The town is surrounded by areas beneficial to pollinators.</li> <li>Monmouthshire County Council have let the people of Monmouth down allowing this situation to occur.</li> <li>I wanted to add that my contact with Nigel Leaworthy in my capacity as treasurer of Dixton Church regarding the maintenance of the churchyard has always been very efficient. the service provided, reliability and willingness, the churchyard is well maintained. and we appreciate that.</li> </ol>

Rees	Кеер	A SOLDIER, A TREE AND A WILD GARDEN  I am lucky enough to live in St James' Square and when I open my shutters every morning the first thing I see is the small remembrance garden, dominated by the enormous Catalpa tree and the beautiful statue of a WW1 soldier standing guard. The tree has been there for over a century and in October this year, the soldier will have stood there for 100 years. I often wonder what my soldier is thinking and feeling about today's world. I think he would be sad. He went off, at possibly no more than 18 years old, with other men from Monmouth and the surrounding area, to fight in one of the bloodiest wars in history. He fought so that his future family could live in a wonderful world. He would ask why — when his friends and relatives died for future generations — do we take this world for granted and why have we trashed it and why, despite warning after warning, do we continue to wreck it?  We are now fighting another war, a war against the deterioration of our planet. A climate war — a different war to the one my WW1 soldier fought, but a war that is no less important.  Making this one small patch of land where my soldier and his beautiful tree stand into a wild garden, which is managed appropriately with the flowers and plants that attract pollinators, is a tiny battle in the current climate change war. It is this way of planting that will make a difference — the pollinators are dying because humans are destroying their habitat. They need these plants to survive so that they can go on to pollinate the plants that we rely on for our food. The new way of managing this small space will also prolong the life of the Catalpa tree so that future generations can stand and admire its majesty and might.

		We all have to be willing to change the way we do things in our everyday lives. In the decisions we make, from the mundane to the complicated, we must think, not about the current world but about a world fit for children and grandchildren – for those future generations – just like my soldier did over 100 years ago.
C. Boase	Кеер	I would like to write in support of the Nature Isn't Neat planting programme in the garden at the War Memorial. I hope the programme will be extended to get rid of all regimented "municipal" plantings elsewhere in Monmouth (eg at St Thomas roundabout). They are lifeless, boring and so last century.
		The "wild" planting at the memorial will take time to settle down, but even in its early phase it is full of variety, interest, beauty - and insects. A solution may be to have a small patch of mown grass close to the Memorial and leave the rest of the area in a pollinator friendly state.
		The science is clear that it is bad for the catalpa to have people walking over its roots (so please let's not have the Monmouth School choir standing in that area anymore on Remembrance Sunday). But I see from this week's Beacon that one objector believes you can just raise the soil level and all will be well. That is a well-known tactic of developers who want to kill trees - the extra weight of a few inches of extra soil is enough to polish off even a mighty oak.
		The council has declared Monmouth a bee-friendly town and it supports Nature Isn't Neat. I hope very much that it won't be blown off its course by a few objectors. It is a great example it is setting. Be brave.
B. Handley	Кеер	The Indian Bean Tree in St James's square can be damaged by repeated applications of weed and feed to a lawn beneath the tree. A wildflower area as currently planted is bee friendly, lower cost to maintain and more environmentally friendly than the formal planting that was previously implemented.
C. Shields	Change	We would prefer to have the garden formal like it was. We accept that the intention was good but it hasn't turned out how it was supposed to. Accept that this may have been due to COVID but it's not had the TLC it needed and it is now an eyesore. We think it is disrespectful to the War Memorial and so needs to be more formal. It now looks unkempt with stray bits of grass. We support the goal but there needs to be a happy medium.
S. Mazzi	Кеер	I live very near that garden and I was delighted to see the wonderful transformation of the space that took place last March. The planting was done by a group of volunteers, with plants bought with Council funds. The Council had approved the design, based on permaculture, a concept that promotes harmony with nature, taking care of people and other creatures, making sure that we can sustain human activities for many generations to come. I am very proud to live in a town where its Council promotes and supports permaculture for its green spaces. What a wonderful way to honour those who fought in the past for present generations to live good lives. I believe that promoting today sustainable practices, like permaculture, will continue the purpose of our heroes' sacrifice in the


		past. Monmouth will be creating a harmonious environment for us, our children and their children's children to live healthy lives.
		Monmouth stepped into that culture change necessary to sustain our environment for future generations by adopting permaculture for some of its green spaces. It would be quite sad to see that reversed to green space design ideas already proven not sustainable and detrimental for our environment.
J. Bowkett	Change	I am writing with regard to the Mermorial garden, we live opposite in 12, st James square, since being planted out last year the garden the garden is nothing but a mess and consists mainly of weeds! I appreciate the necessity of Bees, and indeed all pollinaters without which our planet could not survive! However it is such a shame to look out to see what could be a beautiful area, looking so awful.
		There are many perennials which could be planted in a more formal and orderly way such as, Lavender borders, Salvia, Mahonia, Borage, Rosemary, Sage, Thyme, Marjoram, to name but a few! All of which are colourful, but more importantly Bee magnets.
		As a resident of the Square, our preferred planting wound be more formal, with perhaps pathways and borders creating an area more suited to that of a War Memorial Garden, but with no compromise to our pollinators!
J. Bara	Add	I would like to write in support of Transition Monmouth. The War Memorial site is certainly improved in terms of aesthetics and sustainability thanks to their dedication.
		By nature, the War Memorial instils a diverse spectrum of emotion with the public and its appearance ought to consider this, with sensitivity and respect.
		I would like to offer three design suggestions and if they are of interest to those chairing the working party I would happily join the working party to contribute further.
		<ol> <li>Soften the railings:         <ul> <li>Railings can appear oppressive, confining. This is contradictory to values the memorial stands for - peace, democracy and freedom.</li> <li>I would suggest planting some shrub roses to break up the line of the railings - the long flowering season lasts into</li> </ul> </li> </ol>
		November and the flowers will be visible from a distance. Hanging planters are another option.
		2. Raised planting area:

		Currently craft poppies are placed behind the memorial at ground level which is awkward for those who find bending down difficult and it is not particularly visible. I suggest installing a raised planter. Seeds of traditional red and yellow (Welsh) poppies could be planted by the British Legion and Transition Monmouth either directly or propagate first and plant immature plants during Spring. White cyclamen could be included in the planter, providing white flowers at the time of the Remembrance service.  3. All season Flowering:  The site is rather dark and could be brightened with pale coloured flowers. With a few additions, colour would be provided all year round. For example: Early Spring: Crocus. Late Spring: Forget me nots (for their symbolism). Autumn-Winter: Liriope Muscari (white) at ground level. White Cyclamen at ground level under the tree and in the planter.  An artist's impression of the site at maturity could be produced to show all parties what the site would look like at maturity.  I wish the working group well in taking the project forward.
H. Ronicle	Кеер	I feel the new planting in St James's square is appropriate for the space. It was planted in 2020, leaving and area of grass directly under the Catalpa tree and native planting around the tree. This native planting is appropriate as it not only provides pollen and nectar for invertebrates (species we all rely on for life but who have seen a 45% drop in numbers in the last 30 years) but is also a mix of plants that would have been known to the soldiers in 1914. I feel this planting is wholly appropriate as we are honouring the lives of those who died for our freedom with plants that would have been familiar to them and by using this space to help solve the problems we face today we help to ensure we to can have a future and they did not die in vain.  One of the suggestions from the meeting on 9th November is to plant the area with a flower rich turf will only be a short term solution. The soils in this area of Monmouth are loamy clay soils with moderate to high fertility and impeded drainage, this fertility will have been compounded by the regular mowing and mulching of the grass cuttings in recent years, hence the flowers will only last for 2 to 3 years before the area becomes dominated by grass. The use of heavy moving machinery will also increase the compaction under the Catalpa tree shortening its life. To maintain this area as flower rich turf, even for a few years, the cuttings will have to be raked off, this is an ongoing cost for the Town Council.
E&G Williams	Change	We both know and are happy with the fact that Nature isn't Neat, and we are great believers in the necessity of having as many pollinator-friendly plants as possible, in and around Monmouth. We understand their necessity and appreciate the joy they afford us as well as future generations; we have ourselves been gardening with that in mind for over 31 years.  However, it is important not to lose sight of the fact that in this instance, we are not talking about just a garden or a woodland glade, but a WAR Memorial Garden. As such, we believe that it deserves the respect due to the many who have made the ultimate sacrifice for us, and therefore must be kept tidy-looking and orderly.

		Someone said that in their opinion, the area beneath the Catalpa tree looked 'like a field of old cabbages right now'. Not flattering, nor inspiring.  Obviously, we don't want the roots of the Catalpa tree damaged or harmed in any way. Would it be possible to protect them with an additional layer of top soil? Maybe a compromise could be to then cover that, with turf seeded with wild flowers that can be mown and made to look neat in time for November each year, as suggested.  Wildflower meadows, and gardens, can and should be created on ANY OTHER plot in and around Monmouth, on road-side verges, banks, and big and small patches of ground - thankfully, Monmouth has many such spaces! The War Memorial Garden should not be one of them.
S Chivers	Change	I am appalled that MTC and MCC, without public consultation, have handed over the small pieces of land that houses our War Memorial to some obscure group and allowed them to desecrate it. Not only were they allowed to plant the whole area with weeds but were given £2000.00 to do it. No other town in the land would allow this to happen. That piece of land is sacred and should be kept immaculate every day of every week, not just on one day in November as has been suggested. It is a constant reminder to us how much we owe to those who fell in 2 World Wars and continue to fall in conflicts around the world. To see it neglected must be so upsetting for families whose relatives are named on the monument. Shame on you.
		On behalf of those who care I am asking MCC to reinstate the turf and to continue to care for it as it deserves. The Catalpa tree, at some point, will end its days and will be replaced, the bees will continue to thrive in gardens and fields.
		So MCC please do your duty to residents and reverse your decision, don't give in to a minority of people who have no emotional attachment to our fallen and care for the monument and its surrounds as befits its importance.
Royal British Legion	Change	I am writing on behalf of the Committee of the Monmouth Branch of the Royal British Legion, we are unanimous in our request to ask for the removal of plants adjacent to the War Memorial in St James Street as per the attached pictures of how the garden looks now and a more formal planting take place as before a picture of this is also attached to enhance the visual appearance of such an important site.
		There is no doubt in our minds concerning the importance of pollinator planting schemes and fully recognise the good work of the County Council, Monmouth Town Council and Transition Monmouth. A mix of low growing grass and flowers has been suggested and has been researched and priced by Mrs Campbell as an alternative and more suitable solution to the current planting. The Catalpa tree has only a limited time left, whereas the War Memorial will be there for centuries to come and we at the Monmouth Branch of the Royal British Legion are committed to preserving and protecting it for future generations. 

The Garden is the responsibility of MCC, they are entirely responsible for the dire state it is in. They did nothing to ensure full consultation took place before the work was carried out.


The fact that the Royal British Legion was not consulted is extraordinary to say the least.





Cummings	Кеер	On a voluntary basis, using my knowledge and skill as a professional planting designer specializing in planting for wildlife, I have been involved with the changes to St James Square from the beginning of the Nature isn't Neat project. I attended numerous meetings with all the partners involved, including Monmouth Town Council, and drew up the planting design with all the parties' approval and the guidance and full agreement of Mark Cleaver and Nigel Leaworthy from MCC.  It's now nearly a year since the planting was done, it has worked remarkably well to fulfill the brief of Nature Isn't Neat, the requirement of the wellbeing of future generations act and to give pleasure to numerous residents.  In an effort to appease those who only decided to object to the planting when it had been in for six months, I volunteered again to help councillor Dewhurst find an acceptable compromise, which after the meeting on the 9th November, we thought we had.  Now after so many knowledgeable people involved in the project gave their time freely, I am very concerned that the Town Council now sees fit to throw it open as a free for all to anyone with a view, knowledgeable and informed or otherwise.

Richardson	Кеер	Members of the Green Spaces group discussed St James Sq via Facebook in November - we had a high level of engagement with 10 people taking the time to actively comment although of course this was not a comprehensive survey of members. They were all supportive of the perennial planting and the objectives behind it. The priorities which came out of the discussion were the need to be guided by the experts on how best to preserve the Catalpa tree and there was also support for sustainable planting which fits with Monmouth's title as a Bee Town by providing food for our pollinators. Some suggestions were made, including planting perennial poppies and having a regular working party to guide the site as it develops. I'm sure that between us, Transition Monmouth and other interested groups and individuals we would have plenty of willing volunteers who could help and would be guided by the experts.
		I absolutely acknowledge other people's desire for more formal planting around the area of the memorial itself and I believe there has been a suggestion of planting a meadow mat of grass, which would allow flowers to grow in the summer but which could also be easily mowed in time for memorial services. This would also create a space for people to place crosses.
		From a personal perspective, I would like to say that I do care about the function of the Square as a place for Remembrance – our family lost a relative fighting in the war, and we are an Army family, with my husband just coming up to 22 years' service with the Artillery. We have friends and my husband has colleagues who were injured and killed in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Our daughters are just starting to understand and become interested in our family history and they are also very engaged in protecting our environment. I do understand that for some people, this kind of more wild planting scheme doesn't seem right around a memorial, but I would like to respectfully suggest another way of looking at it — these little plants can both support the past, by reducing damage and improving the soil for the roots of the much-loved veteran tree, while at the same time they can help us face the big challenges of the future by improving soil health, providing food for pollinators and raising awareness. I find this a really inspiring image and very appropriate in the context of remembrance.

So I do hope MTC will agree to support this planting plan to allow it to develop further over the next 3 – 4 years.
